sharing good news

Congo Literacy Project

Well over 200 literacy teachers have been trained from communities across south west Congo, and that number will continue to grow. Their literacy classes, based in local churches, are currently reaching over 3,000 persons, many of whom come from outside the church. On joining the class they hear the Good News of Jesus and see it in action through teachers and classmates as they learn to read and write. Many have made commitments to Christ and have joined the church as a result. Women leaders of

the Congo Mennonite churches call the project they initiated two years ago, "Evangelization through Literacy."

Aimerance Kabebe (pictured below), a trauma healer and Mennonite Brethren pastor's wife from Uvira in the eastern province of South Kivu in the Democratic Republic of Congo was one of the 16 trainees who gained the skills necessary to train new literacy teachers in July 2019 in Kinshasa. Unlike the other trainees, Kabebe had not spent a year or more conducting her own adult-literacy classes. She came late to the project, which had not reached her territory because there are few Mennonite congregations in the region. But when she heard about it, she immediately knew it was something she needed to do.



Kishelele Bible Translation

A team of 8 Bashelele church leaders from several denominations including Mennonite Church of Congo (pictured below), are working to translate the New Testament into the Kishelele language. They have completed a first draft, which they are now correcting with the help of consultants from the Congolese Association of Bible Translators. The hope is for a final version to be ready for printing sometime in 2020. For the first time, the gospel stories will be available in the Bashileles' heart language. We trust that some will be drawn to Christ through this translation, just as it will deepen and strengthen others' faith commitments.



discipling the next generation

Leadership Training in Sierra Leone

AIMM, in collaboration with the Evangelical Mennonite Church of Burkina Faso and North American partners, is regularly sending teachers to conduct leadership training for the Christ Salvation Mennonite Church. Most recently, in August 2019, Siaka Traoré and Steve Wiebe-Johnson led conversations on marriage and family. New Generation Scholarships in Burkina Faso

A second generation of leadership is emerging in the Burkina Faso church. Six young men have each benefitted from ministry experiences, and are now adding university level education as further preparation to serve, with the help of partial AIMM scholarships. Issa Outtara and Sidi Traoré have completed two years of a B.A. in theology from Logos University. Othniel Dakuo and Josué Coulibaly are pursuing M.A.s in theology at Logos. Nicodème Coulibaly is completing a B.A. in missiology at the Sahel Institute of Missiology, while Fabé Traoré is completing his second year of a doctoral program in Transformational Leadership at U.A.C.A (Christian and Missionary Alliance University at Abidjan).

CEFMC Guesthouse

The Mennonite Brethren Church of Congo, in collaboration with AIMM, has undertaken the building of a guesthouse in Kikwit. Begun in 2016, it is nearing completion. The goal is two-fold: to increase Congo-based income to help with the church's ongoing mission; and to create a safe, secure and quality space to house church leaders coming from outside Kikwit for national or regional meetings.
