Hearing the voice of Anabaptism

in South Africa today

For the Anabaptist Network in South Africa (ANiSA), Anabaptism is a lens through which to re-discover Jesus and his call to witness and discipleship. The tradition offers a spirituality of *gelassenheit* and a posture of the believers' church.

ANiSA's 21st century Anabaptist embodiment of Jesus' gospel highlights five theological convictions: 1 centralizing Jesus is integral to our realities and faith as we are not interested in Anabaptism as an end in itself, but as a lens through which to rediscover Jesus and his call to witness and discipleship: Anabaptism is an accompaniment to engaging the world, 2 a critique of the Christendom that both Catholic and Protestant traditions embodied in the Reformation and post-Reformation period, 3 the church as an alternative social body, the Messianic community, 4 we are at a distance from power, a critique of the state and civil society in South Africa, a radical alternative, 5 peace (shalom) and justice are at the heart of the gospel.

The Burkina Faso spring school holidays provided an opportunity for a reunion of sorts.

Yaya (Benjamin) and Madina Bengali, along with their two youngest children, have been living and ministering among the Jalunké people of southern Mali for the past year. Sent by the Evangelical Mennonite Church of Burkina Faso to be the first missionary presence in that part of Mali, their four older children remained in Burkina to continue their education. Spring break was a time for them to travel to Mali, for the family to be reunited, if only over the holidays, and for the older children to see their parents' ministry.

Indeed their work has been fruitful! A small group of believers has emerged. They meet every morning to start their day with prayer and are writing worship songs in their own language. Young people have responded well to Yaya and Madina's invitation to learn about Jesus and become the nucleus of a new community of faith. Praise the Lord!

Economic stability in Kahemba, DR Congo

Join the AIMM family in celebrating the opening of five **village savings and Ioan associations** (VSLAs) in Kahemba territory of Kwango Province!

With AIMM's assistance, the Mennonite Brethren Church of the Congo (CEFMC) started 9 VSALs in Kwilu Province in January 2022. They provided the **training and structure for 225 participants to increase their capacity to provide for their families.**

After three trimesters in operation, the 9 associations had added the equivalent of \$10,788 USD of their own savings to the \$2,700 of seed capital that AIMM supplied.

The 167 members of the 5 new associations in Kahemba, 114 women and 53 men, belong to a population once heavily involved in the search for diamonds. Since the diamond business has decreased, VSLA participants are investing their work and capital in other income-generating initiatives to increase the well-being of their households.

Literacy in the DRC


One woman's story of how the literacy program has changed her life

33% OF WOMEN IN THE DRC CANNOT

READ OR WRITE

I had polio starting when I was 2 years old. Because of the illness I was not able to go to school. Thanks to AIMM with its literacy for evangelism project I heard about literacy from Mama Fumana and my teacher, Mr. Kingulu, who taught me at home because I couldn't get around.



Now I am able to read and write correctly. I write letters and get responses. I try to respond with what I have learned in the literacy for evangelism program. I can also teach others at my home. The literacy program also helped me learn to count better and calculate numbers better.

It is also this literacy training that allowed me to attend computer training at CAL Congo (Computer Assisted Learning -Congo). They love me and it is also because I already had some knowledge from my literacy training that I was admitted to Cal Congo. God bless.

AFTER SHE CONTRACTED POLIO AT THE AGE OF 2, Gizela's life changed.

Unable to attend school, Gizela didn't learn to read or write until she joined the literacy program at the age of 40. In order to attend classes, however, **Gizela had to hire two motorcycles**:

one to transport her wheelchair and one for herself. Earlier this year, AIMM provided Gizela with a second wheelchair to leave at the institute where she is taking computer classes so transportation is a bit easier.

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Christian faith—at the site of struggle

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Reflecting about and living Christian faith at the site of struggle is the way Mzwndile Nkutha (Mzi) describes the ministry of AIMM partner ANISA (the Anabaptist Network in South Africa).

Drawing on the legacy of four decades of AIMM missionary work with African Initiated Churches in southern African nations, Mzi leads this network of congregations, pastors, and other committed Christians from many different churches and denominations. Despite different backgrounds, they share a common conviction that the Anabaptist faith tradition has something of value to offer their churches and communities Some churches struggle to help members caught in cycles of poverty to find sustainable livelihoods. Others are coming to grips with the continued prevalence of practices and assumptions of Apartheid that have not disappeared, despite the formal end of Apartheid structures

Together, ANiSA members are discerning how to be, in both thought and practice, a faithful people of God. In the face of conflicts aggravated by inequity among people of different classes and races, they are working to build communities of shalom that share the healing Gospel in contexts where there is brokenness and violence. Through Mzi and his co-workers, the Anabaptist legacy is strengthening Christian faith in South Africa and beyond.



PILGRIMAGE as a theological praxis

- The practice of pilgrimage is a way of unlearning speed.
- It is a helpful paradigm for mission... the goal of the pilgrim is not to solve ื่อ but to search, not so much to help as to be present.
- Pilgrims are slowly confronted by a different world that begins to interrupt ഒ their own
- Pilgrims do not rush to a goal, but slow down to hear the crying and pain of 4 the community. They are not as interested in making a difference as they are in making new friends. The pace is slower, more reflective
- ഒ Pilgrims set out not so much to assist strangers but to eat with them.

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ABCD Training for 50 People

Thirty participants including students teachers Kalonda Bible Institute school management staff, high church leaders, and high school principals have attended ABCD training at Kalonda Bible Institute This has enabled the

institution to develop a plan of action based on local resources. The training has helped to shift the mind-set of the Kalonda Bible Institute Community. They are now looking from inside, starting with what they have, and building with what they know. The school is developing the capacity to initiate projects with available assets and seeks leverage to expect growth.

The Mennonite Community of the Congo (CMCo) had its first ABCD training session from August 21 to 25, 2023, in Tshikapa.

50 participants attended, including national and provincial church leaders women, youth, and lay leaders, education and health institution managers from all CMCo conferences.

Continuation of relief efforts for internally displaced people in Bita

The church in Bita, DRC, is continuing to show God's love to their neighbors by supporting people displaced in the conflict between the Teke and Yaka ethnic groups. So far the church has provided:

> Temporary housing for 13 families Permanent housing for 8 families Health care for 6 people, including 4 children Surgery for 1 person 202 25-kg bags of corn flour to 58 families

Reverend Kutumbana reports that many of the displaced people have started to worship with Bita church members, and some of them have converted to Christianity.

Efforts continue to find training, housing, and farming opportunities for the internally displaced people in Bita. These efforts would not be possible with your prayer and financial support; thank you!

The literacy project in the Democratic Republic of the Congo is **changing the lives of women** who could not read and write. They are now active in their churches and can undertake self-help activities for their families, including income-earning opportunities.

This project has also impacted some non-believers and people of other faiths who have now made the decision to **accept Jesus Christ** as their Lord and Savior.

The Evangelism through Literacy Project was **started by women leaders** of the three Congo Mennonite denominations in **partnership with AIMM**. Currently, there are a total of 2,803 people taking classes in 8 provinces spread out around the DRC. Literacy is changing lives and AIMM is proud to be part of this partnership!
