

Lifting up new leaders



New leaders in Burkina Faso seek to be better equipped

The Evangelical Mennonite Church of Burkina Faso has been slowly and steadily growing over the past 40 years. The church now has around 25 congregations and over 700 members. This development is remarkable, considering the dominance of both Islam and African Traditional Religion in that context.

The church's Basic Bible Training program, its first attempt at training its own leaders, began almost a decade ago. The first several years this program struggled to find even one or two students. Pastors and other church leaders are generally perceived in Burkina Faso as being poor, and it is a difficult job at the best of times. Anyone who ventures into such a vocation needs a strong sense of call to stay the course.

Years of patient building and investing in youth on the part of established leaders, is beginning to pay dividends. Last year for the first time the church approached AIMM with a problem—5 young leaders were seeking either to begin or continue university-level programs to develop their gifts and better serve the church. They needed financial help to undertake these studies. Would AIMM be willing to assist them? AIMM said "YES!", delighted to participate in strengthening future church leadership.

Over the last five years, AIMM and Christ Salvation Mennonite Church have been gradually building a relationship through a series of visits, connecting leaders within both organizations, getting to



Congo is illiterate. About one in three Congolese women are illiterate. It is no wonder that literacy was identified as a priority for the church by Marie Fumana, Adolphine Tshiama, and Hélène José Mbombo, leaders of the women's organizations of the Mennonite churches in Congo. Offering literacy training is a way for the church in Congo to bestow dignity on the vulnerable and invite new members into their churches. When AIMM joined the effort by providing funding, we had no idea what the scope of the impact would be. Since its inception one year ago this extraordinary collaboration has already provided literacy education to well over one thousand students!



Churches collaborate to provide literacy education in DR Congo

Claudine Lutondo, one of the first literacy students in Kinshasa, stepped up to the lectern with her text in hand. She held the microphone and read her prepared speech in Lingala without hesitation before the large audience of over a hundred gathered to celebrate the graduation of the first literacy students from the training programs in Kinshasa. Their teachers, friends, family, distinguished pastors and theologians, community leaders, and AIMM staff were among those in attendance. The celebration included choir performances, exuberant worship, and reflections offered by distinguished guests all to recognize the incredible achievement of the

twenty women and men who became literate in their own language in less than one year.

Almost a quarter of the population of Democratic Republic of the Literacy classes are emerging all over the Congo, as more and volunteer teachers are trained by Rev. Timothée Sila. In April as many as 70 individuals, men and women, young and old, from around the region, gathered in a long, crowded classroom in Mbuji Mayi for a weeklong training organized by Joseph Nkongolo, Service and Development Coordinator of Mennonite Church of Congo and Hélène José Mbombo, President of the National Women's Association of Evangelical Mennonite Church of Congo. This is the third training and a fourth is tentatively scheduled for Tshikapa in August of this year. Volunteers desire to become literacy teachers to reach out to their communities, to empower brothers and

sisters who never had the chance to learn to read and write, to bring good news to the oppressed.

Joseph Nkongolo gathered the group of eager volunteers and maintained morale in the crowded room by asking everyone to rub their hands together and then pass a blessing on each person as they came to the front. Before long the whole room was rubbing their hands together, smiling, and laughing as they shared blessings. Beginning with such small acts, giving of themselves, they are not only teaching literacy skills, they are building the church.
